Digital Resilience in the American Workforce (DRAW)

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Building Skills and Literacy for Equitable Advancement

September 2021

Technology is integral to nearly every aspect of our daily lives, including the way we learn and work. Therefore, everyone must develop <u>digital resilience</u> —the awareness, skills, agility, and confidence necessary to be empowered users of new technologies, actively participate in society, and adapt to the labor market's ever-changing demands for digital expertise. To ensure that learners achieve digital resilience, educators must develop programming that integrates and applies digital skills content that's immediately relevant yet forward-looking and designed for use in multiple contexts.

Yet <u>research shows that</u> a nearly 32 million Americans struggle to use a computer, and <u>half of all Americans</u> a say they are not confident using technology to learn. Moreover, many adult education instructors have not been trained in best practices for offering digital literacy instruction to learners. Persistent gaps in access to technology and opportunities to develop digital skills exacerbate societal disparities, disproportionately impacting <u>Black learners and workers and other people of color</u>. This digital divide threatens to impede economic recovery efforts, as <u>more than 8 in 10 mid-level jobs</u> require digital skills.

To help adult education practitioners improve their ability to support learners who struggle to fully engage in tasks that demand use of digital technologies, JFF and World Education, with support from the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Career, Technical, and Adult Education, have launched a new initiative called Digital Resilience in the American Workforce (DRAW). Through DRAW, we aim to do the following:

- Support professional development that enables teachers to be strategic and learner-focused in their lesson planning and instruction
- · Support adult education programs in designing effective, flexible technology-enabled education and support services
- Provide state Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) funders and their professional development providers with
 models, guidance, and resources for supporting programs that sustain and expand digital literacy efforts

As part this new undertaking, we will provide the field with flexible, evidence-based, and piloted strategies and materials that help teachers build the digital literacy and digital resilience of adult learners. These efforts will help to ensure that adult learners can obtain the technical skills necessary for postsecondary education and training, employment, civic engagement, and economic self-sufficiency.

ELP Standards on LINCS

Preparing Adult English Language Learners for State-Adopted Academic Content Standards

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Three new e-trainings are on track to support your implementation of English language proficiency (ELP) standards—and academic content standards—for adult English Language Learners (ELLs). These ready-to-use e-learning courses will get you started in using ELP standards to support ELLs' academic language development and engagement in content-area instructional activities.

We recommend working through these trainings as part of a professional learning community or staff meeting, though the course material is also designed for independent learners.

- <u>Module One: Introduction to the ELP Standards for Adult Education</u> provides an understanding of why and how the standards were selected and how they are organized. It also explains what the new ELP standards entail and why and how they relate to state-adopted academic content standards. With the necessary support that ELP standards provide, adult education programs can now expand their capabilities to implement academic content standards for all our learners. Please read the <u>LINCS Resource Profile</u> for *Tips for getting the most out of this module*.
- Module Two: Analyzing Student Tasks in Relation to Content Demands, Thinking Skills, and Language Use introduces the first two steps in a four-step task analysis process. The process is designed to identify what students need to know and be able to do in relation to three lenses: *content knowledge, analytical skills* and *language use*. Task analysis helps us to focus on all the various cognitive demands placed on adult English language learners as they tackle an instructional task or project. Please read the <u>LINCS Resource Profile</u> for *Tips for getting the most out of this module*.
- Module Three: Digging Deeper into the English Language Proficiency Standards for Adult Education is the third and final training in a three-part series that introduces the *ELP Standards for Adult Education* and how to begin using them. Module Three engages users in the last two steps of the task analysis process that was introduced in Module Two. Steps three and four help us to better understand which of the core disciplinary practices *and* ELP standards are relevant to certain instructional tasks—and to instructional practices. This training answers the question: How does the task analysis process support educators' understanding and integration of the ELP Standards during their planning and instruction? 

The 9 skills that matter are:

- Adaptability & willingness to learn
- Communication
- Critical thinking
- Interpersonal skills
- Navigating systems
- Problem solving
- Processing & analyzing information
- Respecting differences & diversity
- Self-awareness
